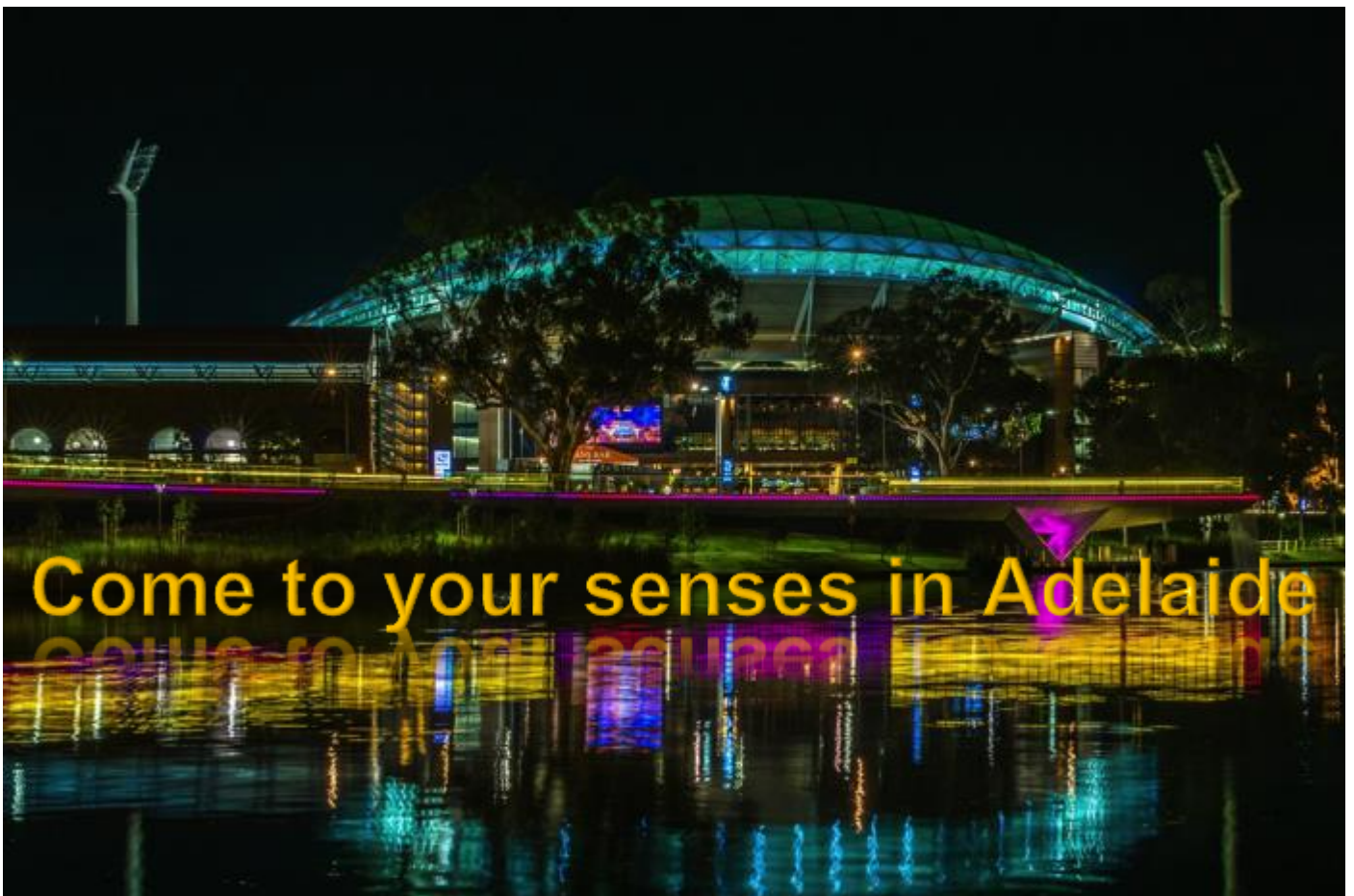

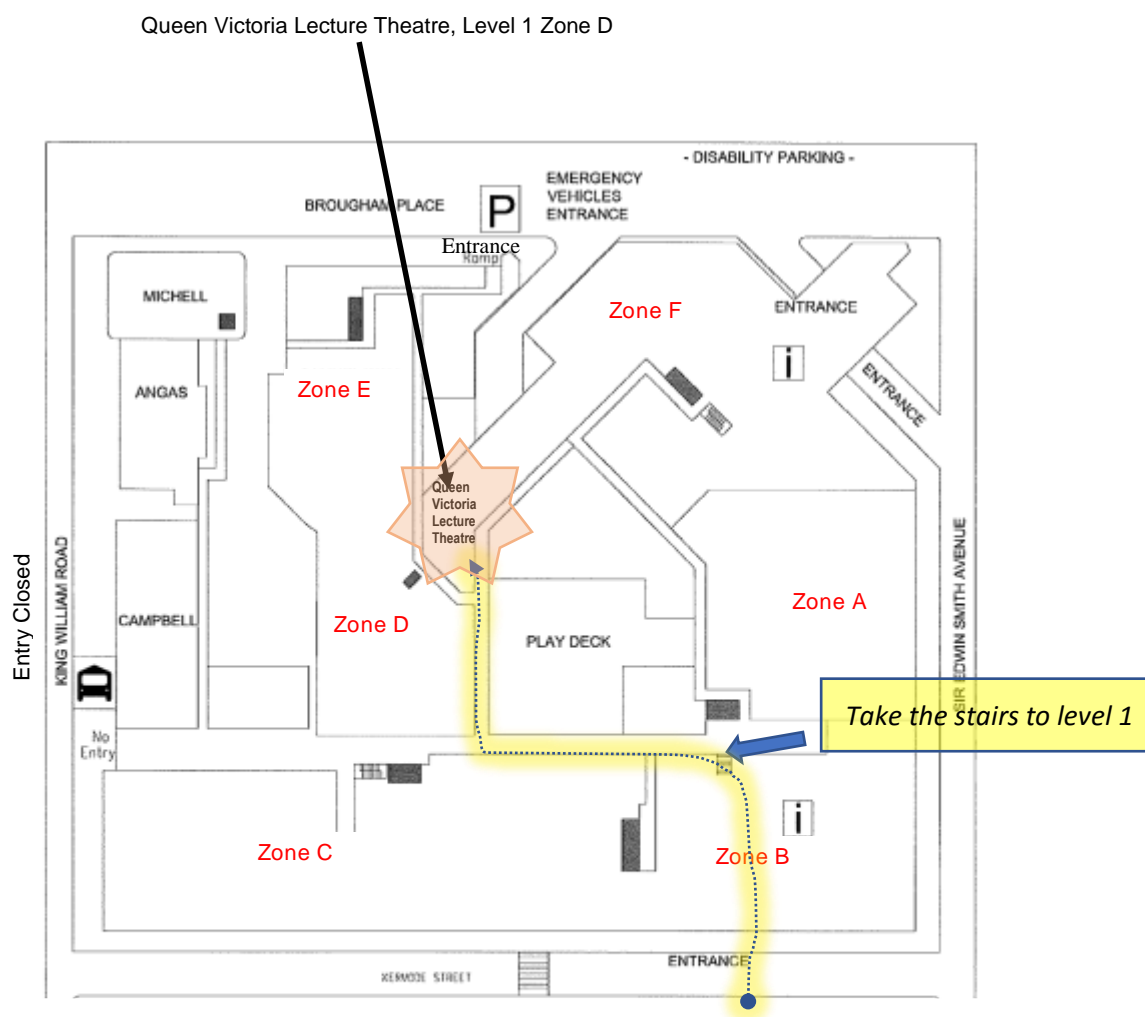

Directions

Conference Speakers

Jozef Gécz, PhD is an NH&MRC Senior Research Fellow and Professor of Human Genetics at the Adelaide Medical School. He discovered or contributed to the discovery of numerous genes for various forms of neurodevelopmental disabilities including cerebral palsy. He will present on the new genetic technologies which are transforming the diagnosis of neurodevelopmental disability.



W. Ted Brown, MD, PhD, is the recently retired Director of the New York State Institute for Basic Research (IBR) in Developmental Disabilities, Staten Island, N Y. (He recently moved to Sydney, married Dr Jacqueline Small, and is now a Visiting Professor at University of Sydney). Much of his research has focused on the Fragile X syndrome, autism, and progeria. He was the first to describe a relationship between autism and the Fragile X syndrome. He will describe progress being made in these areas and new developments in genetics.



Dr Margaret Kyrkou Margaret Kyrkou has over 30 years of experience working with people with intellectual disability, and autism spectrum disorder, both professionally and personally. She works at the Centre for Disability Health seeing children and young people with intellectual disability, autism spectrum and challenging behaviour, and lectures in health issues in disability studies at Flinders University. Margaret was awarded an OAM for services to children with disability, and completed a PhD in Disability Studies. She is an AADDM Committee Member



Dr Jenny Curran: Dr Jenny Curran is a Senior Consultant Psychiatrist in Intellectual Disability Psychiatry working with the South Australian government.



Jenny has a special interest in the autism spectrum and emotional development, behaviour and mental health. She enjoys working with families and with educators as well as directly with the person on the spectrum. Currently Jenny works with children and young people with developmental disability. She trained in the UK and has worked with adults on the spectrum as colleagues and as patients.

Jenny is currently researching the physical aspects of infant and child development that may impact on emotional development, including atypical sensory processing by the interoceptive system, as well as the potential emotional impacts of atypical motor/movement functioning and development, both of which are associated with the autism spectrum.

Dr Jane Nugent: A General Practitioner with a Degree and Postgraduate Diploma in Pharmacology. Over the years she has taught foundation bioscience and pharmacology to both undergraduate and postgraduate health professionals in tertiary institutions across NZ and Australia.



Her clinical area of special interest is caring for complex patients with multiple co-morbidities and/or those exposed to polypharmacy. Her passion remains the targeted teaching of clinically focused bioscience/pharmacology aimed at improving clinical confidence and competence with the specific goal of minimizing the risk of 'medication/medical error'.

Dr Emma Goodall PhD: Dr Goodall is the senior autism adviser for DECD. She has been trialling a number of innovative approaches in SA schools and preschools to meet the needs of students on the autism spectrum. This includes the use of in depth pro-formas to get a good overview of individual presentations of autism and the impact of this on teaching and learning in all sensory areas including interoception.



Nicole Kyrkou: Nicole Kyrkou is a Developmental Educator, a multi-disciplinary disability specialist with an interest in the interface between disability, health and behaviour. She currently works for the Department for Education and Child Development in the role of Program Manager Complex Needs and Mental Health. This work has been focused on how we can better respond to the complex and challenging needs of children and young people with disability within education.



Dr John Entwistle: Senior specialist general practitioner in the field of disability. As the father of a wonderful woman with an intellectual disability, John brings a personal understanding to his work as a GP in Adelaide where he has worked for nearly 40 years. He also works at the Centre for Disability Health, Modbury Hospital, was a long term state and federal member of the Minister's Advisory Council on Disability and member of boards of NGOs, and the SA Council for Intellectual Disability.



Kerry Rye is a Registered nurse with a graduate diploma in mental health nursing. She works at the Centre for Disability Health in the role of Clinical Practice Consultant. The focus of her work is mainly in the area of child and adolescent dual disability emotional and physical wellbeing and health. She has been working as a nurse in the area of



Intellectual disability health since 2001 and actively involved in trialing midazolam doses prior to prescribing for seizure management and then for pre-procedure sedation.

Dr Mohammad Usman: Psychiatrist paediatric developmental disability. Psychiatrist Adolescent Services Enfield Campus.



Dr Christel Burton: As a medical consultant for the Access Assistant Program in SA, Dr Burton has helped children with disabilities to attend government and private schools. Dr Burton hopes her work will help other GPs recognise that working with children with disabilities is not as daunting as it first seems and that they can develop a supportive relationship with parents and carers. Dr Burton is an executive member of AADDM.
